Eastgate Development Taking Shape

After many months of construction the Gelder Group's £5 million re-development of Sleaford Eastgate will be completed before Christmas. This impressive facility will be the new home for Sleaford's whole-time firefighters who are part of the county's Urban Search and Rescue response, and the town's on-call firefighters. The site will also include office space for council staff from their Riverside offices.

On the project Major Contracts Director Kevin Manterfield comments "This project has been fraught with issues but the team have worked closely with our client, Lincolnshire County Council, to overcome these and we are now close to seeing a wonderful building situated on a once derelict and unused site".

Gelder Group has completed specialist conservation and refurbishment works to the historic Harlequin Gallery building on Steep Hill, Lincoln. The former public house turned bookshop, which opened in the 18th century, was known as the Harlequin & Columbine Theatre Inn before becoming the Harlequin Gallery Bookshop 50 years ago. Lincoln City Council appointed Gelder Group to deliver the conservation repair works to the iconic building. Works included the rendering of external panels, timber frame and gutter repairs and new leaded glazing. Dave Gladwin, Construction Director at Gelder Group, said "The Harlequin is a wellknown and much admired building in Lincoln and we were honoured to work on its refurbishment which has restored the Tudor building to its former glory, making ready for a new chapter in its history".

Group Announce Goal of Doubling Apprentice Intake to 70 in Next Three Years

The announcement was made during a surprise visit to the Gelder sponsored 'Construction Careers College' campus in Gainsborough, accompanied by RBS CEO Alison Rose.
